1. Message from the President

I am pleased to present my President's Report to the Brunswick Football Club for 2022.

As always, the Club could not survive without our sponsors, volunteers, members and supporters. The Committee; Tim, Vu, Pete, Jess, Fraser, Ray, Claire, Vanessa and Sam, I thank you for all your handwork, dedication and support over the season. Sam is stepping down from the Committee, and we thank her for her work these past years, including the successful setup of our online shop, the launch of the inaugural Renegades indigenous jumper, and work with our sponsors. All other committee members have confirmed they will return for 2023.

Thank you to our volunteers who helped on game days; Pete, Dawn, Monty and, later in the season, Carolyn, who ensured our canteen ran seamlessly. To our team managers, Lauren and Fraser, thank you for keeping the wheels turning on game days. And thank you to everyone - friends, family, and past and current players - who filled a game day role; this support and commitment continues our community club spirit!

To our sponsors, we know this year was still challenging for many, even as Covid restrictions lifted. We are grateful for the support we received and were fortunate enough to welcome several new sponsors to the Club. Results

Unfortunately, we could not field an U19s team due to ongoing Covid challenges, but we are hopeful to have a team up and running for the 2023 season.

Our women's teams were also impacted by Covid, with player numbers the lowest we have seen since 2016. We debated fielding a single team for the season, but the players and coaching team agreed to push forward with both Seniors and Reserves teams.

The Reserves fielded 12-18 players across the season, with players showing a solid commitment to the Club and their teammates, and unwavering enthusiasm. With four wins on the board, we were only one win and a percentage out of the top four. The Seniors struggled to field their best available team this year and the disappointing five wins and a draw was not a true reflection of how the season played out. With some standout new players, who will only get better, we are excited for the Renegades' season ahead.

The men's Reserves finished the seasons as premiers, breaking the Club's ten-year premiership drought. Led by player-coach Ben Daly, we only had two losses all season, finished second on the ladder and then powered through the final series undefeated. Congratulations to Ben and the playing group! The One Club spirit was out in force for the Grand Final, with players from all teams celebrating a hard-fought win. The Seniors had a red-hot start to the season, which included an after-the-siren win against West Brunswick in round 7. We finished



third on the ladder with a win/loss ratio of 13/4 and a draw. Unfortunately, we lost the first semi final. However, Tommy and the playing group will be looking to build on this in 2023 and push deeper into finals, and hopefully achieve the ultimate goal!

A highlight for our Club this year is the nineteen players who continued their playing pathway from the Brunswick Junior Football Club to the men's teams. This number will only grow in the coming seasons, and we can't wait to have our first Dragon play for the Renegades!

Coaching Staff

For coaching in 2023, we are in an enviable position with coaches locked in for both Senior and Reserves teams.

Our women's team bid farewell to Leonie, Andrew (Geck) and Ned. Geck joined us in 2021 as the reserves coach and has been instrumental in guiding and nurturing our players. Leonie and Ned joined the Renegades in their inaugural season in 2014, and both leave the coaching team as life members, with their contributions going a long way in shaping our women's team and culture. We now welcome a new coaching team, with Sasha Dougherty stepping up from a playing Senior Assistant Coach to Senior Coach – after hanging up the boots at the end of last season. Lauren Hagan joins her as the Reserves Coach who may get the itch to pull on the boots again next season – watch this space!

We are grateful to have Ben Daly returning to his Player/Coach role for our men's Reserves team, and he has indicated his strong desire to go back to back in 2023 – I think the entire Club and its supporters join you in this desire, Ben. And we welcome back with open arms for 2023 our men's Senior coach, Tommy Hunter. Tommy will take on an expanded role, where he will also guide and assist the women's and BJFC coaches – further cementing our "One Club" mission.

Social Events

Off-field, we enjoyed several successful social events and we finally got some normality back at the Club. We held our Season Launch in the Club social rooms following round one, with all teams having a strong attendance. Our Past Players and Coterie Luncheon was held early in the season and had a solid turnout. The Reverse Raffle returned in a slightly different format, which was also a success from all accounts.

After talking about it for many years, we tried a different format for our Presentation night. Although it was great to bring all our players together, feedback from the event suggests we need to keep working on the format to get it right, and with lessons learned for 2023.

One big success from doing things differently this season was our online shop. Previously, we found it difficult to track sales and payments and needed a way to connect with supporters outside of the Club environment. This season we streamlined and enhanced our sales by creating an online shop, and I'm sure our Treasurer, Vu, has never been happier! We look to build and improve this process in the coming years.



Pride and Indigenous Rounds

Another success was growing our Pride Rounds. In 2021 we held our inaugural Pride Round and invited Pride Cup to come out and present an information session and encouraged all players to wear the rainbow socks. In 2022 grew this initiative thanks to a grant obtained by Vanessa and Fraser from the Victorian Government. Again, Pride Cup presented an information session that further highlighted our commitment to our core values, particularly respect and inclusiveness. And, for the first time since we launched a women's team back in 2014, all teams played in the same jumper across our Pride Rounds. A special thanks to Aimy Nguyen for designing this jumper for the club. We hope to continue this as an ongoing round.

And speaking of jumpers, the Women's teams missed out on wearing their Indigenous jumpers in 2021 after the season was cut short; this year, they finally got to wear them! In round 8, the players took the field wearing jumpers designed by local artist Uncle Les Stanley; thanks to sponsorship provided by Lee Group and work behind the scenes by Sam Arthur.

Leo Smythe Award – Best Club Person

Congratulations to Fraser Pearson on being the recipient of this award for 2022. Fraser joined the Committee this season and was an essential conduit between the men's teams and the Committee. Fraser also played a pivotal role in the successful grant for our Pride jumpers and information session and took on the mammoth task of men's team manager. You would also find Fraser standing on the sidelines at men's Reserves games, assisting Ben Daly. And when we needed MCs for presentation night, Fraser threw his hat in the ring. He really did it all this season, so we thank you, Fraser; the Committee couldn't be prouder of your efforts this season.

Season 2023

Season 2023 is just around the corner – all teams will start preseason in early November, and I hope we can all build on the hard work from this season. I am grateful and feel incredibly privileged to have been given the opportunity to be President of the Brunswick Football Club this season. The support I have received from the Committee, especially from Tim, has made the journey smoother, and I am looking forward to what next season brings.

2. Financial Report

Summary

While there was the return to a full season of footy in 2022, the impact of the post-pandemic environment is reflected in the Club's financial accounts.

Revenue from players, sponsors and members are reasonably consistent from seasons prior to the pandemic, which combined with other revenues equate to \$102,881.

The Club's overall profit for the year of \$10,477 is a result of continued savings of expenditure (totalling \$92,404) which was consistent with the prior season 2021 and much lower than the pre-pandemic expenditure of \$154,722 in 2019 and \$162,417 in 2018.

A summary of the 2022 season compared to 2021 is provided below:

Player Subscriptions

The contribution from players in 2022 equated to \$45,719 and is consistent with pre-pandemic figures. The revenue from players in 2021 reflect memberships carried over from 2020.



There were 70 registered players who played across the men's seniors and reserves teams and 60 registered players in the women's seniors and reserves teams.

Merchandise and Fundraising

With the Club carrying stock over from 2021, less expenditure was incurred on merchandise and uniform when compared to prior seasons. Sales reflect a slight mark up on merchandise expenses of \$4,033 and uniform expenses of \$10,484.

The Club trialled new online platforms to manage merchandise and sales to events, such as Shopify and PayPal.

While there was some hesitation in the planning due to uncertainty of the pandemic, all fundraising events proceeded during the year contributing \$6,840 to the Club profits.

Catering

Catering income includes revenue from the bar, canteen and weekly meals. The accounts reflect a strong profit of \$14,293 which take up recorded from payments made primarily from eftpos machines.

Supporter Memberships and Purples Coterie

While there was a return of Club supporters to the ground, Supporter Memberships is an area for improvement.

The majority of the revenue from members come from our newly renamed Purples Coterie, which in Season 2022 was led again by Garry Foulds and Peter O'Farrell. We thank you for your continued dedication and contribution.

Grants and other income

During the year, the Club received a \$6,500 in grants – \$5000 to continue the program to 'Change Our Game' and \$1,500 for Covid recovery.

Operating costs

The Club has continued to maintain operating costs similar to Season 2020, which is significantly lower to pre-pandemic expenditure.

- As the Club did not have an under 19's team, the VAFA affiliation fees were reduced from \$19,224 in 2021 to \$17,811.
- Coaching costs of \$18,500 was also lower than in Season 2020 (\$29,907), when there had been unexpected coaching change with added to the cost.
- The return to a full season and finals was reflected in the costs for trainers which was \$17,930 for the year.

- All other football department costs were reasonably consistent, with total football department cost totalling \$67,090 compared to \$69,251 from season 2021.
- Club administration costs were also consistent with \$25,314 being incurred in season 2022 compared to \$23,358 in Season 2021.
- Cleaning (\$7,681) and Electricity (\$7,750) continue to be the highest costs, these costs are to be partly reimbursed by the Brunswick Junior Football Club.

Creditors

The accounts as at season end 30 September show a balance of \$8,969. These balances largely reflect the invoices which were issued post 30 September 2022 but relate to the season's expenditure. Most of these have been paid since the season end.

Debtors

The amounts of \$4,079 at season end reflect balances from earlier in the season which are to be collected.

Cash holdings

The Club had \$36,795 in cash reported at the end of Season 2022, however this was prior to the above creditor payments being made of \$8,969. When all suppliers outstanding are paid and all money owe to the Club are collected (\$4079), the Club's available cash holdings as at the season end would reflect a balance of \$31,905.

4.1 Renegades

Senior Women (Premier C)

Renegades Coaches' Report

2022 was a year we as a club had yet to experience outside of the prior COVID-19 season. The impact the last two years has had on the community is undeniable; for the first time in the club's history, we had reduced player numbers during preseason. I was a little hesitant to push through with two teams, but with the backing of the President, the coaching team and the players, we made the right call allowing many 1st year players the opportunity to pull on the boots for the first time.

Our list comprised 60 registered players with an average age of 31, of which 25% had never played competitive football. Given our list, the focus for preseason was fitness and skills. Fitness would ensure we could run games out and skills to ensure our execution was good on game day to bank energy to finish games off strong. We had limited space to train at Fleming Park mainly due to hipster picnics, potholes and the oval being an off-leash park for our furry friends, however, we made the most of it, and the vibe set the scene for what was going to be an excellent year for the three F's (Fun, Friendship & Footy).

April rolled around quickly, and round 1 saw both teams losing, which wasn't the start we had hoped for. However, despite the losses, you could see preseason skills and drills were being implemented and executed on the field. Our list numbers were low for the first few rounds, meaning we had several players playing in both games. The Reserves got their first win in round 2, which came down to the wire in the last quarter and was highly entertaining to watch from the sidelines. Unfortunately for the Seniors, that day started poorly, with club veteran Clare Woodhouse going down early in the game with a quad injury that would sideline her for weeks and losing by 74 points. Losing that experience on the field is a coach's nightmare. Round 3 brought perfect conditions and our first home game of the season - for the battle of Brunswick. We came away with our first set of wins for both teams, and we'd only achieve this twice more throughout the season, in rounds 7 and 14.

This season we had two big momentous occasions that are extremely important to our club and the community in which we play. We had the privilege of wearing our indigenous jumper for the first time in the club's history and Acknowledgment of Country from Nartarsha Bamblett. We

also had every team within the club (NOBs and Renegades) wear the pride jumpers designed by Aimy Nguyen.

The final round of the 2022 home and away season was the end of a coaching era for the Renegades. Geck, Ned and I all hung up the whistles. What a year it was for the club, tough by any measure between short numbers and some harsh blows due to injuries. An on-field culture of resilience, determination and endless positivity shone through in the face of adversity. We could not be prouder of how the team handled themselves this year, as we welcomed many new faces to this wonderful club.

NOBs Senior Coach's Report

At the back end of the 2021 season, we put out a player review to all members of the playing group. We received positive feedback around the culture and inclusiveness of the Brunswick FC and its ability to bring people together.

What we wanted to do was allow the players to have a voice in their football and where they felt the Club could continue to grow. The three key areas we felt we could have the most growth and therefore biggest impact in our playing group are listed below and how we were able to reach improve these:

- ***An increased workload in the preseason***

We sought out the advice of Matt Parker (Richmond AFLW High Performance Manager) in tailoring the preseason training sessions. The sessions were a huge increase in intensity and workload and something that helped the overall growth of the team.

- ***A higher accountability from players to each other on their standards***

This is an intangible - what does this look like? For the coaching panel it was about setting the standards early in the preseason and enabling players to drive those standards. From expectations around punctuality, what intensity should be for drills and the voices providing feedback throughout sessions and games etc. We felt that the players now have a stronger grasp of what is expected at training and games.

- ***Increased support for the leaders within the program***

Last year we went into the season with two captains, Nick Burgin and James Schmidt, and felt that they were spread too thin across the players. This year we opened up the players to vote to who they felt leads by example and drives the standards and expectations. Our leadership was formed based on this and included the two players listed above and were supported by Ben Wilson, Adam Bevanda, Kristian Ciciulla, Max Naughton, Jed Carey and Reuben Fulton-Grigg. This allowed for a wider range of voices during training and games and a wider support for all players and the captains.

These improvements listed above, took our playing group to the next level. We will again seek feedback from the playing group and look to continue to improve as a team and as a Club.



Rounds 1-10 W: 9 L: 1

The year started off with a bang. Our first 4 games were wins with margins of 88, 151, 37, and 40 points. We were certainly running on top of the ground from the efforts of the big preseason. Tom Wilson started the season of fire in front of goals with hauls of 4, 5, 6, 1 setting himself up for a big year as a forward. New NOBs recruits but experienced footballers Aaron Christensen and Kristian Ciciulla showed their experience and provided calm heads and looked a class above early throughout the year.

Round 5 was our first loss to eventual premiers Ivanhoe. Despite not kicking a goal in the first half, we fought back in the last to only lose the game by 14 points. This last quarter of fast, fun footy reminded the players about what our best looks like and a never give up attitude.

Possibly the highlight of the season was the Round 7 win against West Brunswick on their home deck, after the siren. West Brunswick would go on to play in the grand final and miss out of the premiership by one point and who are notoriously very hard to beat at home. Lewis White was swung forward at different times throughout the last quarter and capitalised on a quick kick from Gus Ross with seconds in the game remaining. Lewis believed it was 'never in doubt' saluting a set shot from 40m out. We spoke after the game about just how special wins after the siren are and a memory that will hold a special spot for all involved who witnessed it.

On an unfortunate note, we lost some key players to injuries and reports for extended periods of time. Whilst we were able to cover for the front part of the year, we were unable to get the continuity in the latter half of the season, and as such, the results weren't always in our favour.

Rounds 11-18 W: 5 L:3 D:1

A lull with three losses in a row to start the back half of the season against Ivanhoe, West Brunswick and Parade put our spot in the Top 4 in jeopardy. However, rallying wins over Bulleen Temp and Aquinas put ourselves firmly in the finals frame. An ugly, hard fought win over Yarra Old Grammarians demonstrated we were able to flick the switch and put a gap between the sides who were around us on the ladder. In last quarters we were able to put the foot down on the pedal and remain diligent in defending as well as kick a winning score.

A draw against Melbourne High, who were playing for the season, locked in our finals appearance. In a yo-yoing game and with 40 seconds left on the clock, we transitioned the ball from the back pocket with a long Liam Whelan switch into the middle, who found Ben Wilson. Another long kick inside to Tom Wilson who took a strong contested grab in the goal square and a handball off to Aidan Pollock put us a point in front. From the centre clearance, Melbourne High were able to transition down and rush a point, leaving the game all square at the final siren.

Our final two games against cellar dwellers Powerhouse and Manningham (in their last game as a club) got our confidence up leading into the finals. Tom Wilson finished the year how he started, kicking goals. He kicked 51 goals in his new role and will only continue to get better the more times he spends forward.



Whilst we did have injuries in this block, the last 9 games saw new players come in and cement themselves as senior footballers. Tahj Haddock grew with every game in the backline, Jasper Paevere growing into his key position body will continue to be a force to be reckoned with the more he plays. Will McKenzie showed his versatility throughout the year, playing almost every position on the ground. These three players, along with Lewis McKenzie, Zephyr Hooke, Jonathon Haddad, Anthony Alexandris and Gus Russ all played great footy in 2022 and will continue to form the future of the footy club.

Semi-Final

In tricky conditions at a perfect deck in Williamstown, we faced Parade who we were 1-1 with throughout the year. Unfortunately for our boys, we couldn't make the most of the breeze or stifle Parade's scoring when they had it. This now becomes the fuel for next season, knowing that our best is good enough to challenge the top teams and an opportunity to build on our improved fitness base from the handwork put in during the preseason.

Looking ahead

Whilst the loss in the final finished our year on a disappointing note, the year was filled with success:

- 21 Players receiving votes in the Association Best and Fairest
- Tom Wilson kicking over 50 goals
- NOB senior debuts to Anthony Alexandris, Angus Buckley, Archie Fulton-Grigg, Dean Roberts, Josh Hedley, Hayden James, Henry Grist, Aaron Christensen, Jonathon Haddad, Kane Daly, Kristian Ciciulla, Tyler Bruns, Tom O'Farrell and Zephyr Hooke
- A better understanding of what our best looks like and a better knowledge of how to play it.

NOBs Reserves Coach's Report

Coming off a disappointing year in 2021 in terms of injuries, Covid and results, it would have been understandable if we were to have fallen away in 2022. However, as we knuckled down and got into our work in the preseason proper there was a certain feeling in the air, a feeling that was buoyed by an injection of youth and strengthened by the return of many grizzled vets.

As Tommy put the boys through their paces, every Tuesday and Thursday night with the sun was beaming down; a slogan began to ring out across the playing group – 'West Brunswick aren't doing this!'. We were proud of the work that we were putting in, we knew that all those



sprints, conditioning drills and gut-wrenching wrestling drills would put us in the upper echelon of commitment across the comp.

We were excited and for good reason, we had some incredible players arriving from the under 19s and some great footballers who had stuck around from last year's team, all of whom were excited to grow and become better as we trained together.

We are all incredibly proud of how the boys went on the field, winning a flag is no easy feat and we celebrated it in true fashion. However, what Fraser and I saw from the players off the field is what made this season truly special. We saw a true team on the oval each week, a group of blokes who were mates going out each week to have fun together and the results truly speak for themselves.

Rounds 1-10 W: 9 L: 1

The year couldn't have started any better with the reserves group sitting at 6-0, with wins of 111, 139, 77, 77, 100 and 144. Our first loss was at the hands of West Brunswick by 37 points at their home ground. After this loss, we came up against Melbourne High, who were looking to cement their spot inside the 4. The boys came out and played our best game to date with a complete team performance and bounced back with an 83 point win.

Rounds 11-18 W: 7 L: 1

At the mid-way point of the year and sitting second on the ladder we looked to ramp up the training loads and intensity as well as getting as many games as we could into our whole playing group. Where possible, we also looked to give players a week off to freshen up with the impending finals not too far away. Our best game in the back half of the year was against West Brunswick in a top of the table clash in round 12. With West Brunswick getting the ideal start and leading at every break, we played with freedom and really opened the game up with our Brunswick Brand of football. In the last quarter we were able to run away creating a 15-point lead. I believe this win gave us the belief we needed as a playing group that we could really go all the way.

Second Semi Final
